HEADMASTER'S REPORT

After six years, a Headmaster might well be expected to produce some closely textured comment on how he has managed to measure up to the ideas and the ideals with which he commenced or which he should have evolved during the time. However leisure and time is rapidly used up; holidays, so called, come and go — used up in their turn, in my case, by concern for, and demands inseparable from, building, replacement or recruitment of staff, and so on. Such formal evaluation will have to await another time and another occasion.

Probably, satisfactory immediate contact between myself and the school has been maintained but my dependence on Father Prentice, Deputy, Form VI Form Master, and Prefects' Master; on Father Ross, his assistant in matters disciplinary; on Father Franzmann, Director of Studies, and programmer extraordinary; on Father Braithwaite who oversees the Book-Hire; on Father Power, the College Bursar; on Mrs. Jamieson, unobtrusively efficient secretary; and on the Form Masters themselves, has been noteworthy and real. The delegation of responsibilities and authority, while making me dependent on each of the subordinates, has led to the emergence of the Form Master as a significant educative unit. In the process, I suppose the 'Father Image' has become rather fuzzy around the edges.

I sometimes wonder about the value of Speech Nights: a selective rewarding of excellence or reward of selected excellences. Iconoclasts of custom and tradition should perhaps be wary of laying-on too heavy a hand. Probably some report on, and show of, the varied interests and activities of the school is not without point; but much genuine effort and hardy dedication too frequently pass with no specific nod of recognition. There are the usual clichés, of course, and some vague and general, if sincere, reference to those who did not get a prize.

In the conscious or unconscious cult of scruffiness, Shakespeare's 'rug headed kerns' might be gentlemen in the current fad of unisex, though the long, frequently unkempt, hair of the one matches rather ill the shining cared-for look of his counterpart. Length of hair, fashions of dress, are relatively minor, if still important, but personal untidiness and sloppy attitudes whittle down the self discipline necessary in a student and a man. Unfortunately education just does not happen.



Perhaps this apparent apathy is conditioned by a certain Canberra expectancy to have 'the something' provided – usually by someone else, without any personal effort on one's own part. I should also like to see much more work like Neal Hardy's fine Science project, and individual original writing, even without the high degree of publicised success of John Cardiff's poem 'City Life'. Aged fourteen, he won the under eighteen Farmer's Poetry Prize, judged by Professor Leonie Kramer.

Admittedly we teach a critical approach to studies. We encourage the students to be vocal and urge them to be involved. Protest, they will, and sincerely; but it is their vocal protest and sometimes they may be too close to problems to appreciate all the circumstances in which a problem may be set. Working within a framework is something we all have to learn. Optimistic anarchy is understandable but it may not provide the sole solution.

Someone, I recall, wrote of 'the lonely specimen of an uncommon kind – the independent man'. This fellow is not languid or aloof, arrogant or superior, insulated from his fellows; nor is he smug in his own unresearched or superficially explored opinion. He is not a conformist – neither does he conform to unconformity itself! He surely would not conceive all wisdom of the world as shouting with the most vocal minority. It is possible to work so hard at pretending to be different as to lose one's own sense of identity.

Max Harris browses in the newspaper: The Australian,.....Australians are so attuned to the idea that we are a slap-happy, she'll-be-right society, that we don't fully realise the high order of unfussy efficiency with which we carry out our chores.....We may be the great philistine society, but we haven't completely lost commitment to the work we do.

He is making some comparison with the British scene but 'completely' is the operative word. Are any of us, we or the boys, dedicated enough? Supposedly we hold creative leisure as an ideal but.....there is a connection between positive work attitudes, efficient servicing of the economy, and the desirable leisured society. No one can gain leisure when everyone ruthlessly consumes everyone else's time.....I might add: or ruthlessly wastes their own time or that of others – in the class-room or out of it, on the sporting field or off it, in their own homes or out of them.

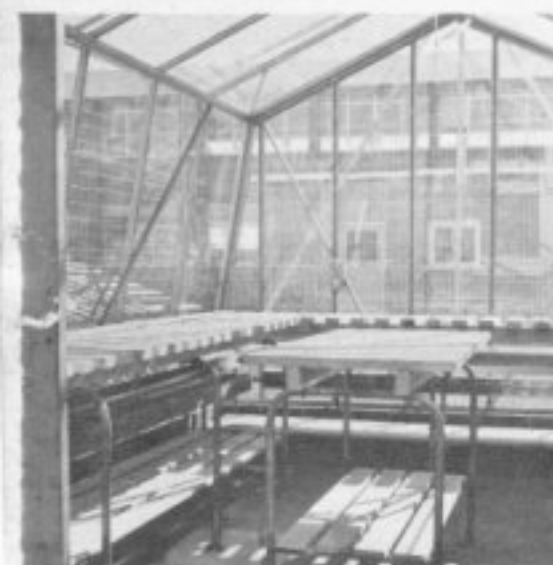
One meets frequent reference to Patrick Goldring's forthcoming book which appears to characterise leisure in a 'Broiler House' society. Living in batteries of houses, working in batteries, travelling in batteries.....watching sport; watching T.V.;.....watching, watching – doing little. In this cramping factory-farm, battery-chicken-house context, the Wyndham concept of the place of Physical Education, Woodwork, Music, Art, assumes a rather proper importance. I notice too a tailing-off of interest and energy for participation of the less competent and of some of the competent in Sport, also for participation in civic enterprises whether outwardly humanitarian or more apparently christian. This is more common in Form III and the Forms above. Percentages are there, always, but they are not high enough. About activity, John Dryden may have a point:

Better to hunt in fields for health unbought
Than fee the doctor for a nauseous draught.

There is always comment about co-education. Frankly, I have an open mind on the subject but some of the argument might assume rather gratuitously that such natural, useful, and pleasant contact with my lady fair can only or best be had, or must take place, during school hours. In a day school? Where does co-instruction cease and co-education begin? Recently we had a most interesting exchange of opinion on social contacts at the monthly meeting of the Auxiliary.

The general comments offered thus far are an effort point up the background against which Daramalan is working.

Speaking generally, too little responsible effort appears to be forthcoming from too many in Forms I-IV, and from many in Forms V and VI — usually from those who can least afford such an indifferent tactic. After listening to a lecture by Professor R. Johnson, on his return from a study tour in U.S.A., I am led to presume to state that even Tertiary Studies should first produce developed people; a person fitted to gain a living is second, if very important. Maybe this way of thinking is somewhat ideal but it contrasts rather starkly with the just-enough-to-pass, not-getting-all-I-can-out-of-it, attitude which is so wastefully productive of underperformance and underdevelopment. This sort of short sighted and easily pragmatic judgement is prevalent right down to school level.

The crisis of personality and the crisis of Faith are very real things, taxing and painful, and where they occur, equilibrium is so unstable as to demand very careful handling. The two may be linked more closely than is suspected. In such a context, the College motto, *Strong in Faith*, emphasises that in a time of change, Faith needs no apology; nor should it be surrounded by diffidence or apprehension. Half a generation ago, a lad who had not long left one of our Colleges wrote me and commented that in the Religious Knowledge periods, as far as he was concerned, his teachers too generally had failed to present Christ sufficiently. Recently, another girl student, in another area, I am told, was vexed that so much time was taken up with discussing problems and that Faith itself and the things of Faith did not seem to her to be given a significant enough place. On the matter of emphasis and its difficult niceties, I understood Dr. Butler, visiting psephologist, to comment on T.V. during the past week on a rather materialist approach in the platforms of both parties in the present campaign to some prejudice of long term vision and statesmanlike ideals. One can also happen on homespun wisdom in quite unexpected places; recently someone gave me a folder of matches and on the outside was boldly printed:

Owing to lack of interest,
tomorrow is cancelled.

..... God.



Sloyan says somewhere that Religion must become a demand item. Dag Hammarskjöld's You can't play with falsehood without forfeiting your right to truth, is equally pertinent. Movement upwards demands effort (the fortitude component of the College motto). Acceleration down is easy and rapid. The world needs men who are involved in problems and situations. Men who can give, men who can stand firm and face up to (and face out) difficulty..... their own or others.

The extent of Commonwealth financial involvement in Daramalan continues to grow. The school facilities will be finished by the beginning of 1970 and the Assembly Hall, Shelter Area, and Change Rooms, by March-April 1970and then someone, or someones can settle down and make Daramalan the great school it can and will be. Projects of this size and complexity which are administered by an individual corporate body would be handled more easily were Commonwealth interest-reimbursement and capital-repayment aligned in time with bank charges at either six or twelve month term.

The per pupil allowances for 1970 may ease somewhat Daramalan's financial burden though a wary, if somewhat less outrightly apprehensive eye, will still have to be kept on Bank Balances. We appreciate the Commonwealth action and trust that the Commonwealth component of education costs will ensure that all children have the advantage of the best possible education, that the States and school people themselves, while still having to be financially rather adroit, may finally be free from worry about finance itself. Let us not be concerned by what name Commonwealth contributions be called: Charity (sic), Equity, Political Manoeuvring, etc., only let funds be responsibly granted, responsibly released, responsibly administered, and responsibly accepted.

I never fail to be impressed by the unostentatious courtesy and efficiency of the officers of the Department of Education and Science. Aware of their own obligations to the Commonwealth, they are alert in trying to meet our problems within the accepted terms of reference. We may not always agree but the confrontation is always interesting, rational, gentlemanly.

Coming to Sport: There is some comment that Daramalan stays in Saturday competition because they dominate it. We stay there because it suits our boys and because it provides bulk competition needed in a large school. The many and varied activities are reported in the Magazine. Some points may be of interest. The increasing status of Summer Baseball as an alternative to Cricket may cause some heart burning but its concentrated activity suits some boys and some coaches. Rowing continues to flourish and the per-

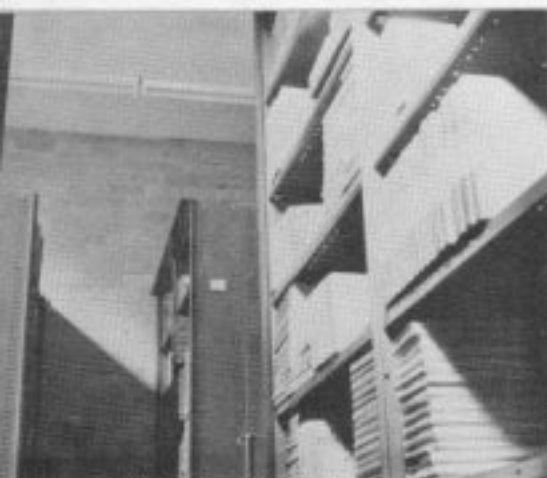

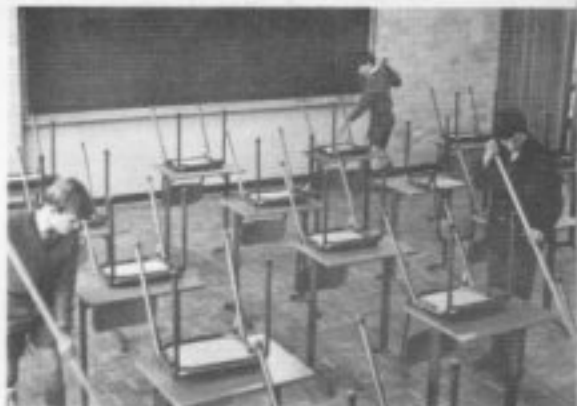
The examination results for 1968 gave great satisfaction: In the Higher School Certificate the best verged on excellent and were very strong in Maths and English. In the School Certificate particularly, where the levels are tailored to cater for a wide spread of ability, a better attitude to schoolwork out of school would make all the difference.

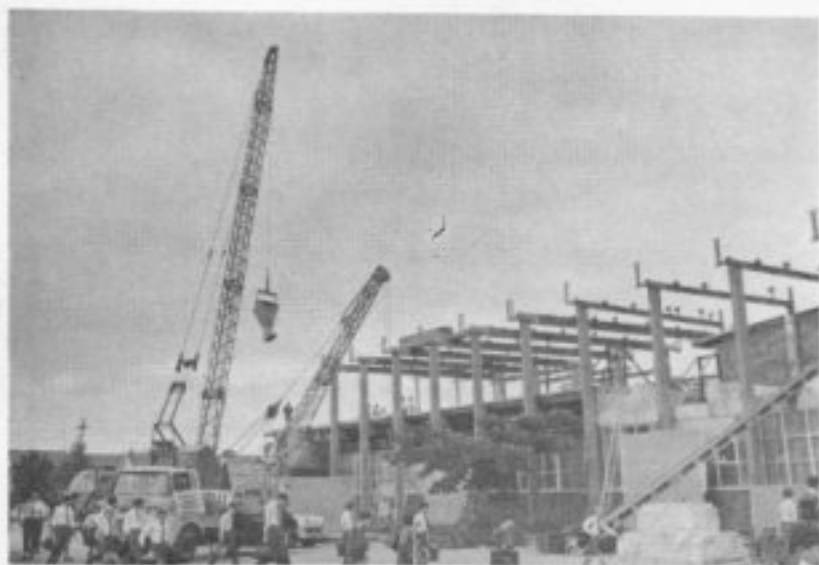

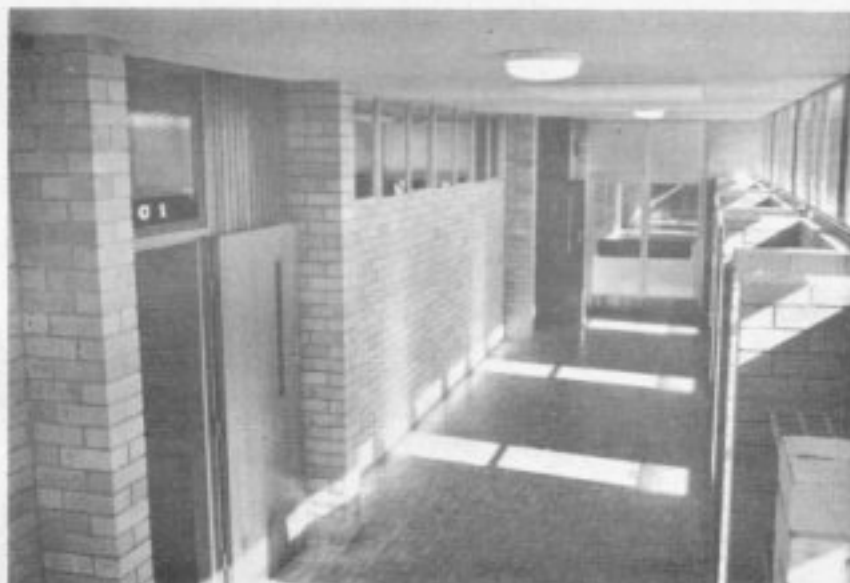

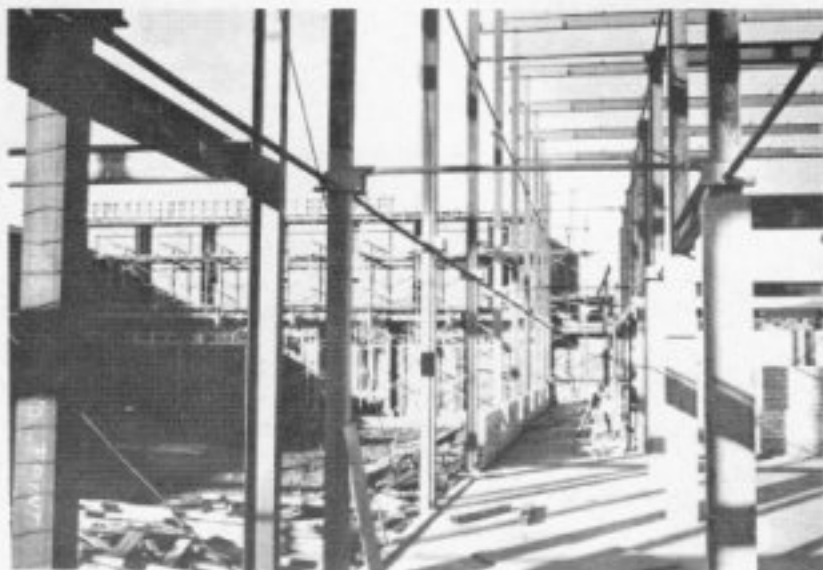
ONWARDS BUILDING 1969

Mt. Ainslie through steelwork of Senior Study Centre – February.

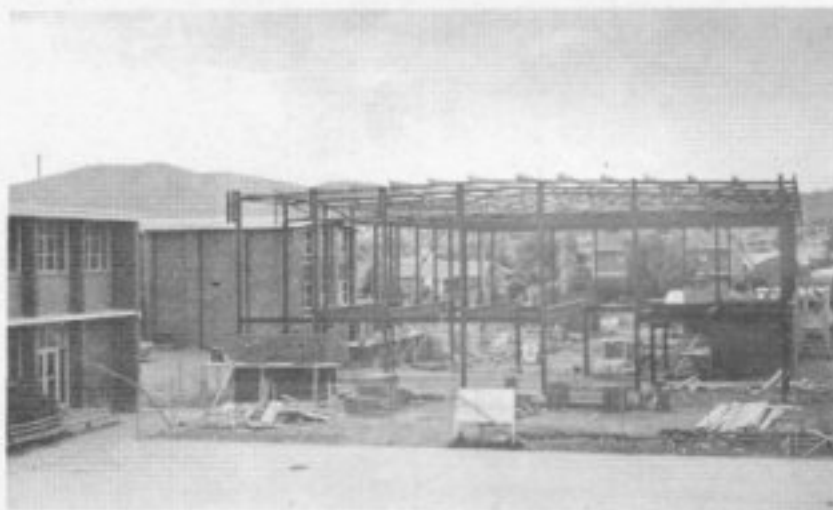
Form 2 Classroom Block completed May.

JUNIOR SCHOOL 1969

In offering the annual report of the Junior School, my position is somewhat like that of the Governor General at the opening of Parliament. The increasing size of Daramalan has forced the Junior School to operate rather as a statutory corporation in miniature than as something over which I have immediate control. Father Naughton as the Master-in-Charge of the Junior School is the responsible plenipotentiary within the area — always suggesting, always planning, always consulting, and when, after consultation, decision is offered, being alert and ready to carry it out.

The Junior School is ever an area of great enthusiasms and incessant activities, a world of hurtling bodies and shrill cries, a world of 'flash cards', of T.V., of radio, of projects, of Japanese exhibitions and 'Defence'; an astonishing area where they 'do' Europe neatly and tidily in a few days (to the wry amazement of the Secondary Teachers in their more involved and complicated situation!); where interest ranges from the 'bug house', through baseball and the various sports, through the ingeniously contrived games of the playground, to the rather more elevated areas of music and the ballet.

I mention Ballet. Quite recently, the Arts Council of Australia brought to the Junior School the different forms of the dance: Jazz, Spanish, Classical, and Coppelia. Clearly the boys enjoyed and appreciated the effort though, in true "boy fashion", many seemed rather shy of acknowledging it openly.

The Junior School also participated in the Canberra Eisteddfod. Their success was not noteworthy though in fairness it might be pointed out that this was not for Daramalan a selected group exercise.

There was pleasing and quite significant interest in activities based on truly Christian sociological concern and which involved an incidental amount of fund raising: for the Eastern Papua Mission; for the Freedom from Hunger Campaign (here one hundred and fifty dollars was raised through the boys' initiative, interest, and Christian concern, together with the enthusiastic involvement of the whole Junior School Staff.). During Lent, the sacrifices of the boys raised seventy five dollars for the Vietnam Orphanage at Phan Rang. A tape recording of the boys' singing, verse speaking, discussion, etc., was sent to the R.A.A.F. and the Orphanage. We were happy to have Bishop Morgan, then Bishop-Elect, at the College to receive the money in kind, and to be rather amused at the sight of a couple of small men staggering forward with the box of coin. Later Flt. Lt. Linden, who had been associated with the project called at the College. The lads also interested themselves in the appeal to help the spastics.

What pleased me most was that these activities were not divorced from a religious context and were, in fact, an example of a full Christian Living which must touch every area of a life. Most of the offerings were made in the context of the Offertory of the Mass or during a Paraliturgie to show that Religion and everyday living are complementary, or perhaps better, that they form a whole. I suggest that the whole process was educationally effective and spiritually enlightening.

During the holidays, under the inspiration and at the suggestion of Brother Rigney, with the support of Fathers Caruana and Anderson, regular holiday walks were inaugurated. Though the weather was sometimes inclement, they were popular and enjoyed by all. Apart from their own intrinsic worth they provided consolation and some relief for many a harried, housewifely, holiday mother.

The Family Life Movement's talks and films, at the O'Donnell Youth Centre, were a tremendous success. The interest of the Parents in this area of their sons' instruction must bear fruit and avoid difficulties which might otherwise occur.

Outside the classroom and in line with what had been done or was to be done, there were the excursions to the Law Courts, to Parliament, to the property of Mr. and Mrs. Jenkins at Goondaroo for the shearing. In many cases these excursions were made possible only by the valued cooperation of those Parents who helped with the transport.

A special word of thanks to Father Anderson for his organisational and directive efforts as the Class Master for all the streams of Grade Six; as also to Mrs. Chapman who guided the destinies of the various streams of Grade Five. To all the teachers — our sincere thanks. It is interesting to note that though they were competent overall, each one seemed to have a speciality whether it be concern and skill in dealing with the slower boys, whether it be handwriting, craft, music, or even sport. Mrs. Fortescue, in the Library, continued to provide the courteous direction and efficient service that the Junior School has come to expect though by no means taking it for granted.

Thanks also to Father Crowe, the Parish Priest of Dickson, for allowing the Junior School to use the Church for Masses for the Primary, as also for his never failing sympathetic interest in all things Daramalan. The Parish Clergy also visited the school on a familiarisation exercise directed to the boys from their own parishes. Such visits cannot fail to do good. The Education Week Concelebrated Mass was a highlight for the Junior School no less than the Secondary. Our thanks to Braddon for allowing us to use St. Patrick's Church.

A rather close relationship has developed between Mr. Terry O'Connell of the North Ainslie School and our Junior School Staff. Highly competent and experienced, he was ever ready to discuss, to inform, to suggest, or to advise. We appreciated his invitation to have our teachers attend at North Ainslie Brian Powell's Lecture: English Through Poetry Writing.

The Snowy Mountains Authority provided a lecturer and films which the organisers of Primary Studies so located that they fitted nicely into their programmes. Similarly with Mrs. Moore who visited the school and discussed with the boys New Guinea and its Crafts. Great interest was taken in the visit to the Coca Cola plant and it was not only on account of the supplies which were on tap during the visit. Peter O'Neill achieved second place in the Essay Competition. In June and October, the Police Lecturers visited the school, spoke to the boys, and showed films: Talking to Strangers, and Road Safety. In May, in connection with Road Safety, we had the annual blessing of the bikes.

In the third term, Mr. and Mrs. D. Mahon rather diffidently offered a T.V. Set with which they were finished. Daramalan less diffidently accepted it and found that the expenditure of a handful of dollars provided a welcome addi-

tion to the technical teaching aids of the Junior School. We should not overlook the interest and generosity in so many ways of the Daramalan College Auxiliary. Thank you once again.

It has ever been the policy of the Junior School to establish and maintain close liaison with the Parents of the boys. After some familiarisation talks, the Junior School organised separate nights for the Parents of the Fifth and Sixth Grade boys. In discussion, to the benefit of both sides, it was satisfying to observe in those who attended a balanced and keen interest in the Christian Formation of their sons. While the response was good, it was rather a pity that there were still some who could not find either the time or the interest to participate in this most valuable exercise. Frequently they appeared to be the very ones who would most benefit.

We think that the Daramalan College Junior School is a good school and warrants the confidence you have in it. That this is so is due in the main to the efforts of Father Naughton as Master in Charge of the Junior School and the dedicated cooperation of his staff, clerics and lay. All at Daramalan are conscious of the responsibility shared with you and stand firm for religious as well as academic values. We want the boys to begin to care for people, for things, for obligations, as the concomitant or the necessary consequence of all the values we try to establish.

For the opening of the Society's new shelter at Turner, the Conference held a Food Drive. From that date on the old men at the shelter must have lived on flour, sugar and tea! After many weeks of activity, interest waned and the members began to lose their "zeal". May saw the conference collapse.

Two months passed... In July a new conference among fifth formers appeared under the guidance of Fr. Mansfield. With a nucleus of eight members, the Conference held its inaugural meeting on July 31st. By September, though membership had fluctuated from a minimum of five to the present membership of seven, the Conference was well established. A food drive was undertaken on Sept. 22-24 and a number of other fund raising ventures were conducted. Next year should see more improvement in both membership and the scope of our activities. Meanwhile, though the Goodwin Centre's wood is no longer chopped by the conference, the windows of the Society's shelter have a new sheen and the grass looks like a lawn!



This year Mr. Vestjens for the first time began to take classes for practical biology in addition to his usual lectures. Several dissections have been carried out under his guidance — rabbits and earth worms. Several reptiles including tortoises and pythons have been studied.

JANUARY: Arrived at school to congratulate builders who were only a term behind and to hear some remarkable concessions in allowance for length of hair.

FEBRUARY: The big month for discipline with the 20 demerit system introduced. Immediately a race ensued as to who could get the most in the least time. A great turnout to sport on the first Thursday brought about classes on the following Thursday afternoons. Fourth Form staged the historic "school riot" by demonstrating for five seconds after the announcement. Also this month, the prefects' inauguration took place and speeches by captain and vice captain seemed to confuse more than clarify everyone's interpretation of the system. A little later on, the swimming carnival was held in which O'Brien took the honours, proving that pupils with surnames beginning with L - P most resemble fish. Star of the show was Peter Wynne, the Open champion, who thus became the idol of all.

MARCH: This month established itself as a month of sporting achievements. The Dodson Shield was contested and won again. The baseball lads acquitted themselves quite admirably winning the Under 12 and Under 14 finals, and the Eagles shared the cup with the Vultures. A very successful rowing season came officially to a close and it is of note to record some of its most notable happenings. A crew, coached by Mr. Hyland, Mick O'Brien, Mark Barrett, Stephen Howarth and Krano (Legs) Kukolic became the first Daramalan crew to win in Sydney, by winning the Schoolboy event in the Leichhardt Club Regatta. The First Four won the Col Panton Memorial Marathon for the second time and established itself as a worthy successor to the 1968 Four by winning nearly everything that was going. The most notable achievement of the First Eight was its second placing in the Head of the Lake, beating the favourite, Grammar, by half a canvas.

APRIL: April 12th saw the beginning of the biggest movement in the school, the football season. The school dominated the Knockout Carnival, winning four premierships and sharing one. Some weeks later the school played St. Augustines from Brookvale, the older teams going to Sydney and the younger teams playing on the home grounds. The results of the Sydney games were not good due mainly to the doubtful condition of the football players arising from the "night before". Also during this month, it was decided that Fifth and Sixth Forms needed spiritual guidance and a retreat was held. Most expressed doubt that there would be one next year. About this time, Br. Hillsdon organised the annual tennis championships. Peter Hyland won the Open Singles, and teamed with Geoff Short to win the Open Doubles.

MAY: A notable month for a lack of exciting happenings, mainly because all were looking forward to the 8th when school broke up. After two weeks of bliss for student and teacher, school resumed and the buildings which were scheduled to be finished in January were ready for use.

JUNE: A merry month for the teachers as the long awaited staff room was ready. These new quarters had plush interior, spacious setting and a panoramic view of the car park and houses broken only by young heathens "recreating". Because of this happy occasion the dreaded flogging machine was withdrawn for a two hour spell. Finally, both the buildings, C Block and the Manual Arts Building, were invaded by "eager" school boys.

Andrew Molan, a former pupil, died on the 1st which was a sad day for many of the staff and pupils who knew him. He had shown an active interest in the school even with serious disabilities which he had. Until the beginning of his illness there would have been few boys so thoroughly a part of Daramalan.

The defeat of the Old Boys by the First Fifteen was an event of note. This hard fought tussle will now become an annual event with a trophy awarded called the Andrew Molan Trophy. Another victory for the sporting clergy was the inclusion of Brother Mortensen in the N.S.W. Country Representative baseball team. The 20th saw the Red and Black Ball which was a great success and enjoyed immensely by all.

Daramalan has always been well represented in the annual science exhibitions with this year as no exception. The irrepressible Mikula brothers, Peter and Honza won prizes, one for dating using Carbon, the other for Backyard Ecology. Morris Conolly and Kevin Woods were also commended. There was also a phenomenal response by Fourth Form to this exhibition thanks to the persuasive influence of Fr. Dempsey.

In the annual Cartography competition Peter Mikula once again featured with a certificate of commendation. Andrew Zawarko won first prize, and Jonathan Hardy also won a certificate of commendation.

Following Daramalan's phenomenal success in Rugby Union was the heavy representation in A.C.T. Representative teams. Five Daramalan boys were in the Under 12 team which became joint premiers, seven boys were in the Under 14 team which won the premiership and two boys were in the Under 16 team which reached the semis. In the Carnival in Sydney two Daramalan Students won the Shell Medallion for best forward play - Jonathan Hardy in the Under 14's, and Michael Langford in the Under 12's. This was a very good effort as the teams competing were the cream of Rugby Union in N.S.W. Also highly commendable was the fact that three of our "men", Brian McGahay, Chris Minihan and Mario Pellegrino were chosen in the N.S.W. representative Rugby Union team which took part in the State Carnival.

JULY: In an effort to enrich their cultural appreciation and education, Third and Fourth Form boys had a drama outing, Fourth Form to *Pygmalion*, and Third Form to the *"Merchant of Venice"*. Fourth Form was quiet and contemplative compared to Third Form who showed a little more spirit in their reception of culture. Daramalan once again showed supremacy when it dominated the Rugby Union Knockout Carnival despite the fact that most teams were weakened by the 'flu'. The Under 10's were beaten in the Grand Final, the Under 11's were joint premiers, the Under 12's were beaten in the semis and the Under 13's and 14's were premiers. A very sad blow to the school was the death of Mr. Jim McGrath and Mr. C. McMahon, two men who had shown a constant interest in the school and were always ready to lend a hand and did this unerringly. Good news for the Hockey people was the inclusion of Charles Ottens in the N.S.W. Representative Hockey team which played in Hobart. It was also the month that Daramalan's First Fifteen met the cream of St. Edmunds and soundly thrashed them in a 17-3 runaway.

AUGUST: Gary Shuttleworth showed the truth of the statement "Good things come in small packages" by winning the juvenile division of the Speedwell Open at Helensburgh, a great feat for this small cyclist against a field of much larger opponents. Daramalan was particularly successful in hockey this year with a record of five teams in the finals. However, the Under 16's were the only premiers. Once again Daramalan dominated the Rugby, winning five ACTJRU premierships. Following this up the First Fifteen defeated Lyneham, the A.C.T. High School champions, by 13 points to 3.

John Cardiff of Third Form won two prizes for his poem "City Life" - \$50 from the Sydney Morning Herald in the Farmers Poetry Prize and also a prize donated by the Canberra Times. As the term drew to a close Fifth Form went on an excursion supposedly to see the Sydney Stock Exchange, but most of Sydney's night life was also seen and remembered.

SEPTEMBER: Fourth and Sixth Forms arrived back at school looking as though many had spent their holidays profitably and were informed of the short number of days until the exams. In another tennis tournament Geoff Short defeated Peter Hyland to win the Under 16 championship. This was a remarkably good month for basketballers with the Under 16's winning their Grand Final and Darryl Sheedy and John Leonard were selected in the CHS team. Fifth Form, not to be outdone by Fourth and Third Form last term, went to see Hamlet and it could be seen that culture separates the men from the boys: Fifth Form behaved like men. O'Brien House once again showed itself superior by winning both the Junior School and Senior School athletic carnivals. The final events of the Senior Carnival, this year held on the College ovals during the week, were conducted in very cold rain squalls.

OCTOBER: A very large body of volunteers was rounded up for the bottle drive, making it the largest Canberra has ever seen. It raised \$404 to equip the new gymnasium. On a less successful note was the debate between Fifth Form and Catholic Girl's High 5th Form.

Noteworthy on the entertainment scene were the basketball games which were played during lunchtime. Most interest centred around the challenge lowly Fourth Form made to Fifth Form. Speculation over the preceding days resulted in final odds of 6-1 in favour of Fifth Form. Even though they fought courageously throughout the whole game, they were unlucky to lose 33-14. Less excitement was involved in the staff versus the combined Form One and Two Team. The staff won easily.

At last plans materialized with the foundations of both the Assembly Hall and Gymnasium being laid down and serious building getting under way. Fire drill brought the whole school out with a rush and provided a break from classes. The Sixth Form gathered back at the college for the farewell dinner on the 24th. The Primary School had their final fling in their Speech Night at Dickson High School Auditorium on December 1st.

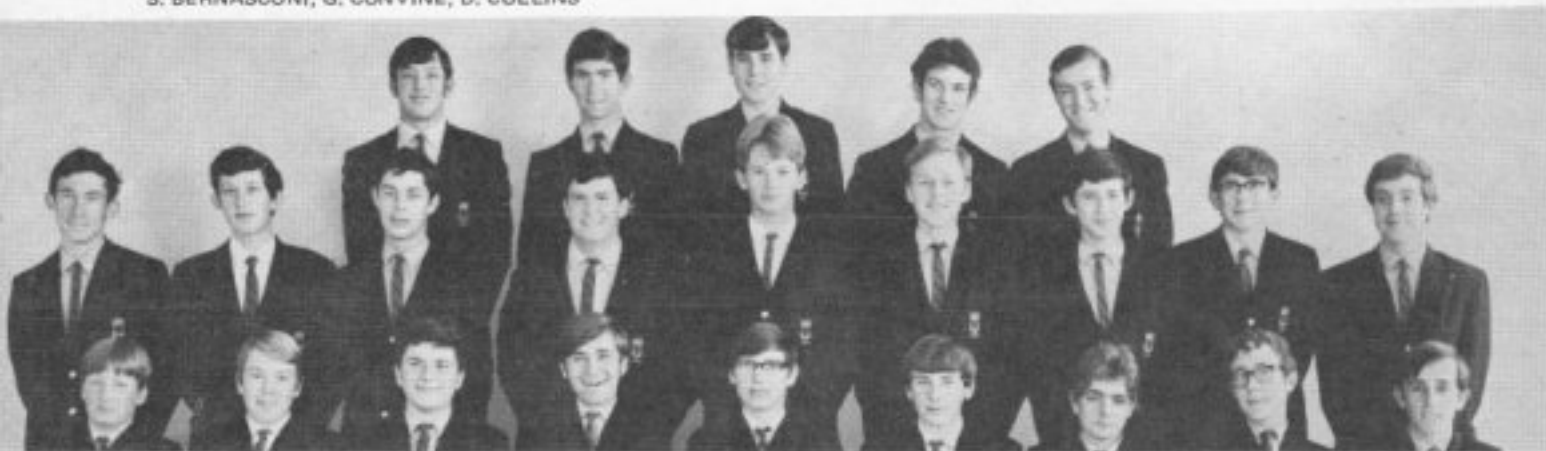

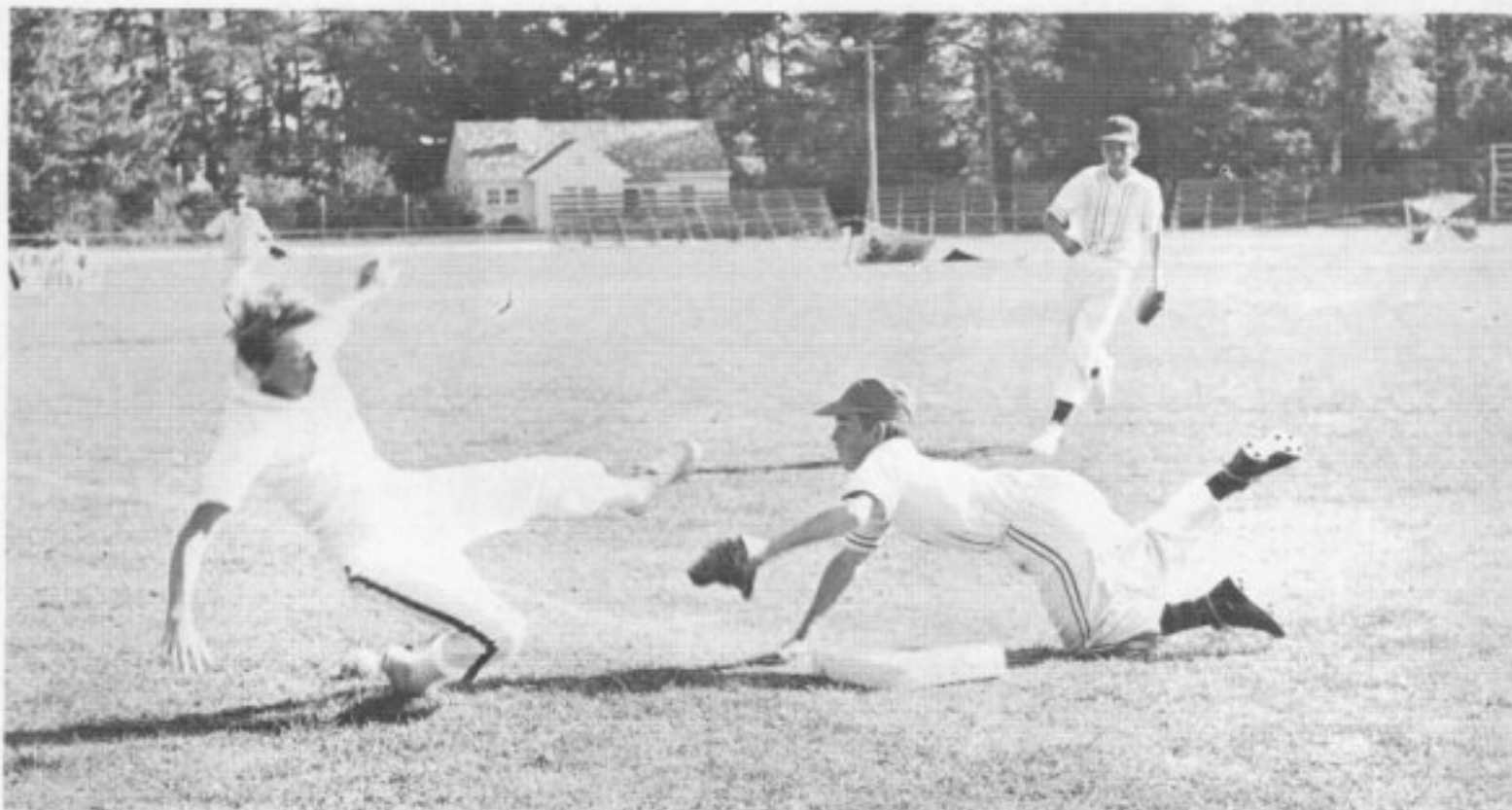

However, most of them are available for this age group next year so prospects for a good season are promising.

C Grade experiment

A team was entered into the C Grade section of the senior Hockey competition played on Saturday afternoons. It was composed principally of U 16 players with the addition of several older ones to give a sense of maturity. It proved to be a sound venture and the preliminary final was reached before they were eventually defeated. Three priests from Daramalan's staff played with this team and collected a host of friends and a large number of goals.

Daramalan Hockey is indebted to the many friends and supporters who helped during the season. It would be impossible to operate on the scale we do without their necessary and generous assistance. We offer our gratitude to all who have rendered assistance and we pray God to bless and reward their every kindness.

College crews competed in regattas in Canberra and Sydney during the 1968/69 season and some good performances were recorded.

At the Leichhardt Regatta in January four of the first eight (K. Kukolic, M. Barrett, S. Howarth and M. O'Brien [str]) won a school fours event defeating two metropolitan high school crews. At the Newington Invitation Regatta in March the college first four (G. Pickard, G. Jones, M. Gebicki, and R. Volpato [str]) rowing against GPS crews, who are much tougher competition, ran second in their heat defeating Scots College who ultimately won the final from Sydney Grammar with St. Josephs just pipping Daramalan for the third position. Lack of fitness was the reason for our failure in the final.

For the very first time in rowing history we had an eight of good standard and although this crew notched only one victory in Senior/Junior ranks over 2000 metres for the season, they recorded the fastest time for this event (6 min. 35.2). At the Fourth Annual Head of the Lake the eight rowed a creditable second to Telopea Park with Canberra Grammar in third place.

It is noteworthy that the eight was the first to upset the Grammar-Telopea dominance of the Head of the Lake and considering the upset in the crew only 5 weeks before, performed particularly well. A new number four man had to be found, trained and consolidated into the crew. But with some determined training and devoted coaching the new crew managed second as already stated. We all hope next year's eight performs half as well.

The eight which was coached by J. Hyland, esq. comprised P. Hiscock (bow), J. Byrne (2), A. Jamieson (3), P. McDermott (4), K. Kukolic (5), M. Barrett (6), S. Howarth (7) and M. O'Brien (str). During the season they were ably coxed by John Cahill.

Following the pattern set by the undefeated First Four of 1967/68, this year's First Four, competing in their first season of rowing, registered some impressive wins. From 18 starts in local events, they scored thirteen wins, three seconds and two thirds. At the Daramalan Regatta on 15th March, they set a new record for school fours over 1500 metres (5 mins. 35.8 secs.) and one hour later won the Maiden fours also in the record time of (5 mins. 31.6 secs.)

The College was well represented at the 1969 Head of the Lake, and in addition to competing with distinction in the major events, we had crews in the Tub Pairs (won by P. Spellman and P. Sculthorpe with J. Cahill cox) and in the second and third fours in which we came second and fourth respectively.

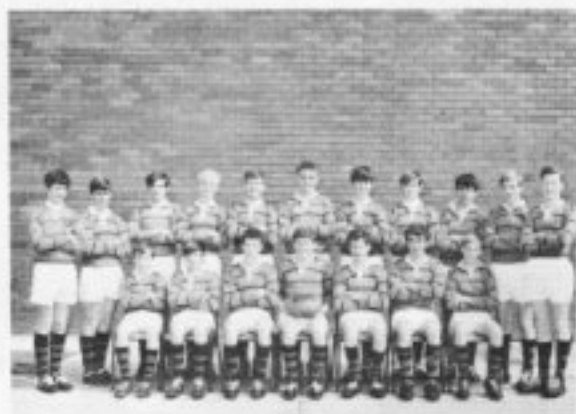
